In York County, Kelsey was able to demonstrate her skills as well as her enthusiasm and drive, earning the position of Executive Director for the Henderson Chamber of Commerce as a junior in college. With an energy that is contagious, she has led the Chamber forward, working with local business owners and the community to tackle challenges and create opportunities. Opening a non-profit daycare to serve new and existing residents is just one example of how she is building coalitions and getting things done. “We were able to launch a daycare in just eighteen months and that daycare has made it easier for more than twenty-five families to work in our community - I am one of them,” she said.

“I love that I can make a difference in my immediate community and the larger community that will affect the future of our area in positive ways,” said Kelsey Bergen.

Emily Lutz first came to York in the fall of 2010 as an 18-year-old college freshmen, looking for a place where she could not only learn as a student but also have opportunities to grow outside of the classroom.

She excelled in school and quickly began an internship with the York Parks and Recreation department, furthering her education through the hands-on mentorship she received from Cheree Folts, the Parks and Recreation Director.

“The two years I spent learning at the right hand of Cheree Folts, now Parks and Recreation Director, helped to mold me into who I am as a leader and reinforced the importance of living in a collaborative community, something I didn’t get to witness first hand, growing up in a large city like Omaha. I’ve chosen to stay in York because it’s not only been a great place to work, but a fun place to live, and an even better place to grow,” said Emily Lutz.

In addition, York has been a safe and comforting place for Emily to live, while being away from family. “York has been a safe environment for me to learn how to be an adult, living on my own. As I’ve become more connected to the local community over time, I’ve established trustworthy relationships with everyone from my dentist to my auto mechanic. It’s not unusual to run into a business owner while grabbing coffee at the local coffee shop. I always enjoy catching up with them about all that’s happened since we last worked together,” said Emily.

Emily has plenty of opportunities to meet new people and deepen her connections within the business community because she lives in downtown York. “Living downtown gives me immediate access to restaurants and shopping, not to mention a front row seat to events like the Farmer’s Market and the annual Yorkfest Parade,” said Emily.

Popular activities include:

- Bird Watching: Witness the annual duck and geese migration at [Kirkpatrick Wildlife Basin](#).
- Boutiques/Shopping
- Bowling: Throw a strike on one of the 16 lanes at Sunset Bowl in York. Open year round, Sunset Bowl offers youth, women's and men's leagues and cosmic bowling on Fridays and Saturdays.
- Campgrounds: Choose from over five different campgrounds in Henderson, McCool Junction, Waco and York. All offer various amenities.
- Children's Museum
- Clayton Museum of Ancient History
- Disc Golf: Try your skills on the 6-hole course at Mincks Park in York.
- Fishing: Spend time on the water fishing for bluegill, largemouth bass and catfish at [Recharge Lake](#) or set your sites on channel catfish, white bass, bluegill and rainbow trout at Lakeview Park. There are also numerous other lakes in driving distance if you want a day-cation.

- Golf: Improve your handicap at one of York County's three grass green golf courses – Henderson Golf Association (9 holes) in Henderson, Sandy Meadows (9 holes) near Waco or [York Country Club](#) (18 holes) in York.



- [Henderson Mennonite Heritage Park](#): Located just north of Henderson, and one mile south of I80, was built to teach the Mennonite history. It includes a replica building of the original Immigrant House built by the Burlington Railroad that housed the first Mennonite settlers in the area, a Country Mennonite Church modeled after a church that both branches of the Mennonites built in rural Henderson in the late 1800's. The park also features a turn of the century farmhouse, summer kitchen, granary, outdoor oven, windmill, water tower, outhouses, chicken house, a general store and fully restored barn built in 1911. Nestled in the back corner of the park is a metal machine shed, housing large pieces of equipment and a shop.
- Hiking/Biking: Take in the scenic hiking and biking trails along Beaver Creek Park in York or around the lake at Henderson's Lakeview Park.
- Horseshoes: Practice your throws at any of the many horseshoe pits in the municipal parks throughout York County.
- Hunting: Take aim at deer, duck, pheasant, quail, geese, grouse, dove, squirrel and rabbit during the open Fall and Winter seasons. Hunt DC offers professionally guided bird hunts from September 1st through March 31st.
- [Junction Motor Speedway](#): Catch the excitement of stock car racing in McCool Junction. Cheer on your favorite driver every Saturday night from April to October.

- [Kilgore Memorial Library](#): Children's story hours, reading programs, internet access, historical resources and various trainings.
- **Movie Theater**: Come see the latest blockbuster hit at the Sun Theatre in York on one of three theater screens. You can even catch a great deal with \$5 movies on Tuesdays, affordable concessions, and \$1 Wednesday matinee movies for children in the summer.
- **Parks & Playgrounds**: With over 10 municipal parks in York County feel free to relax, have a picnic, take in the arboretum, stay fit by utilizing the numerous sports courts or trails and let the kids play on safe and imaginative playground equipment. You can also enjoy visiting and meeting others while taking your dog to the dog park.
- **Racquetball Court**: A court is located inside of the York Community Center for all enthusiasts.
- **Skating**: Roller skate...do it now! Roller skate...York Skating Rink will show you how! Otherwise head over to the York Skate Park in Harrison Park with your board!
- **Sledding Hills**: Those who say Nebraska is flat haven't been to York County to experience the numerous hills to sled down during the winter season.
- **Swimming**: Three municipal pools, including, 2 aquatic centers and 1 indoor facility for year-round swimming, will exceed your swimming expectations and provide hours of excitement. To take a dip visit York or Henderson.
- **Tennis**: Perfect your forehand at one of many courts in Benedict, Gresham, Henderson, McCool Junction, Waco & York.



- [Wessels Living History Farm](#): Located just south of York, Nebraska. For travelers, the farm is just one mile south of Interstate 80 (Exit 353) and Highway 81. The 145-acre farm now features a early 1900's home, a red, timber frame barn, corn crib, machine shed, garage, chicken coop and a large windmill typical of the 1920's. These structures were chosen to begin the "living history farm" experience. To the south, there is a modern tractor display building with many tractors, stationary engines and combine. Surrounding the buildings is a modern farm operation that is still producing crops. Offered at the farm are many educational opportunities.
- York Parks & Rec offers many activities for both youth and adults.
- [Yorkshire Playhouse](#): Come laugh, cry and figure out "whodunit" at the Yorkshire Playhouse, a community theater that has provided excellent live productions for over 30 years.
- York College: [York College Art's Department](#) is sure to entertain with music and theater. Also, with 15 different [athletic teams](#), it's easy to catch a game.

York County Housing Options Give Buyers & Renters Choices

There are several new housing developments in progress in York County so now is an excellent time to purchase a new home! There are also two rental development projects underway, expanding the rental options in York County.

For those who prefer a historic craftsman style home, cottage or newly constructed home – these homes are available in York County as well. Finding a charming farm-style home with a porch swing to rock away the afternoon is not only possible, but entirely affordable.



Houses go for as little as \$120,000 in towns like McCool Junction or Henderson too. Of course, there are also large executive homes available in the area for those who need a little more space and prefer modern design details.

“It’s not every day that a 22 year old can buy a house but because of people who work really hard in this community, grants are provided to people and I was able to take part in a grant that helped me buy a house, and do some maintenance to the house that would not have been possible for me without that opportunity,” said Bre Goben, Marketing Coordinator, Central Valley Ag.


Millennials Love that York County’s Location Offers the Best of Both Worlds

York County Has a Great School System for Young Families As Well

Those with children will appreciate York County's award-winning school system. York County has many early pre-k Childhood Opportunities. From pre-schools and centers, to in-home daycares, there are several options. According to Nebraska Health & Human Services, there are 29 licensed facilities, giving families choice.

There are three public school districts in the county and parents can select the district they want to send their children to, regardless of where they live. In addition, there is a Catholic and Lutheran K -8, along with a K-12 Lutheran boarding school in York County.

York County schools are known for their good fine arts department, athletic programs, music department, and holistic approach to education and lifelong learning.

From a career perspective, school districts in York County are committed to following the Career Pathway mode where careers are organized in six career fields. The six fields include the 16 Career Clusters, which group careers that involve similar work. Each school district has developed Career Academies to provides education along a chosen career pathway. All schools also participate in the Regional Career Day exposing students to business panels and businesses from across the region as well. This has created an ecosystem that promotes connections between students and local businesses.



Students can go from pre-school through their master's degree in York County, and once graduated they will find a good job waiting for them.
